Dear Friends,

Over the past few weeks at our Sunday services, we have been exploring the question "who on earth are we?" From 'we are chosen' to 'we remember', this preaching series has been an opportunity to step back and reflect on our calling as Christian people. As the series draws to a close in the middle of this month, it would probably be safe to assume that we still have more to learn as we unpack our Christian identity. But how do we do this? We currently have 4 house groups meeting across the benefice with more details to be found on our website. In addition, from the 4th November, we will be running the 'Bible Course', an 8 week online interactive and informative way of learning and engaging with God's Word. Thirdly, worship. Worship brings us into the presence of our loving heavenly Father. Now our churches are open again we can worship together on Sundays and midweek on Wednesday mornings. However, for those unable to make it, there are a huge variety of other resources from zoom church to the Church of England 'Daily Hope' phone line; from broadcast services to printed material. If I had to summarise in one phrase who on earth are we, I would describe us Jesus' followers. My prayer for us all is that we continue walk in the footsteps of the master in the weeks and months to come. Blessings and Peace

THE EVOLUTION OF MY PRAYER LIFE.

"If you are there, SHOW ME!" Does shouting at God when you are 12 and in a very rebellious mood, count as PRAYER?

That was in 1958...There seems to be a bit of a time lapse after that, and I can't honestly say, that I felt God had shown Himself,

but in 1965 I was persuaded to be Confirmed, and subsequently found myself attending church and was married therein. Our Curate and his wife ran PRAYER meetings and at one in particular, Jean Darnall, an American Evangelist spoke very powerfully, and offered the laying on of hands. I'll have that I thought. I'd like what she's got! I didn't feel any different though. I started to do all the right stuff in church. Sent the children to Sunday School etc. I did PRAY but only on my terms and special occasions. Daily? I don't think so. I was really very keen to feel 'chosen' and to speak in tongues – a sort of proof that God knew me. It wasn't until 1970 that I realised I was a churchgoer/doer and that something was missing in my life. I PRAYED long and hard and then one day, when I was stoking the fire actually, it suddenly hit me. Jesus said 'You must be born again'. Oh! I get it! Physical first. Spiritual second. I invited Jesus to indwell me with His Spirit. From that very moment my PRAYER life changed, I think it went from my head to my heart. I WANTED to pray. I found myself talking with God all the time. Him and me. So PRAYER became a PERSONAL relationship with God, through Jesus with His Spirit in me. What a change. Obviously I get low or rebellious sometimes, and still have it out with God, but He listens and understands and I feel secure in His love. Then, only three weeks ago I was asked to lead intercessions in church. Panic. I had never done that. It led me on another PRAYER journey. I had spent over 60 years talking with God. PRAYING one-to-one with people. Ministry Teams etc., So what was the difference? Well Jesus said that when two or three agree on anything in His name, His Father would grant it. I realised that CORPORATE PRAYER is Powerful. So here I am still learning. Did God hear me shouting at Him after all? What do you think? Linda Wilson

Stop Fighting in Your Own Strength

'... WE DO NOT WAGE WAR AS THE WORLD DOES.'

2 Corinthians 10:3 NIV

During World War II, Allied bombers carried machine guns in the nose, under the belly, on top, and in the rear. B-17s, better known as 'flying fortresses', carried thirteen .50 calibre machine guns. At one point scientists suggested the planes might actually be safer without them. Without the extra weight needed to operate the guns, they could fly faster and higher, increasing their odds of survival. The pilots, however, thought differently. They

wouldn't even consider embarking on a mission without guns to shoot back and defend themselves.

With that thought in mind, Jon Walker says: "We make the same choice when it comes to fighting our own battles." God says we don't need the guns ... we can soar higher and faster with Him. "For though we live in the world, we do not wage war as the world does." The weapons He gives "have divine power to demolish strongholds"; we don't need the 'weapons of the world' (2 Corinthians 10:3-4).

But we say 'No thanks', we have to shoot back and defend ourselves with arsenals of angry words, demanding attitudes, manipulative manoeuvres, excessive excuses, and bombs of blame. It takes courage to stop using weapons of the flesh, 'take up the shield of faith', and arm ourselves with the weapons of God (Ephesians 6:16). It's the kind of faith David showed when he [told] Goliath, 'You come against me with sword and spear ... but I come against you in the name of the Lord ...' (1 Samuel 17:45).

Stop fighting in your own strength and let God's spiritual arsenal defend you; '... He is a shield to those who take refuge in Him' (Proverbs 30:5).

An 'a-moosing' way to make a difference

Pupils, parents and teachers at Cutcombe and Exford Church of England First School have been having an 'a-moosing time raising money for their Send a Cow Harvest Appeal.

They have been drawing, painting, sticking, colouring and photographing to create a Cow Gallery. There are more than 80 pictures of fat, thin, tall and short cows in all colours of the rainbow. As well as having lots of fun, they have raised £210 to fund a real cow through the charity which will support a family in rural Africa.

Bishop Ruth, patron of the charity, said: "A lot of thought and creativity has gone into this joyous project. A cow will make a huge difference to a family's lives."

'A beautiful occasion'

Nine new Readers were licensed by Bishop Ruth last month. As lay people authorised by the bishop, they can now return to their parishes and lead certain parts of worship, to preach and to carry out pastoral and teaching duties. INTERVEIW Serving with the force

Andy Paget has been chaplain to the Avon and Somerset police for almost 25 years. He is also a pastor at Trinity Tabernacle, central Bristol.

Why did you become a chaplain?

I feel if we are not where people are, how can we be relevant? By being a chaplain people can see I am serving them unconditionally and that is my passion.

How do you support the police?

We support all police staff and their families with any issue that is important to them. If there is a major incident we also head to the scene and offer support to officers on the ground and at times can be a bridge between the community and the police force.

How have recent events affected your role?

I circulated a force-wide message assuring staff that we were still there for them and affirming how much we value the work they do. That's important for them to hear. Police officers have to make decisions quickly, without the benefit of hindsight. When their actions are being reviewed, as they were recently following the Black Lives Matter protests in Bristol, we can affirm them in their role and be there for them.

Any advice for a potential chaplain?

Like many things, the more you put into the role, the more you will get out of it. It requires a real commitment and it is only through that will you see the benefits.
