Rector's Letter

"There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens". Ecclesiastes chapter 3 verse 1.

Dear Friends,

As the nights draw in and the season changes, the bible verse above is a timely reminder that life is full of different seasons. Whether the seasons of the year or the seasons in our lives, we all experience times when much remains the same and times when there are changes.

Change can be tough, and I know that some people particularly struggle with it, whether the change of circumstances following the death of a loved one or a new medical diagnosis, changes can bring challenges.

Some of our churches are looking at making changes in our buildings to grow the life of the church not just for now but for generations to come. What was 'fit for purpose' a hundred and fifty years ago is, we are finding, probably not suitable for today's needs. I am grateful for the wisdom and grace of the church family as they navigate what can be difficult discussions around these changes. I am also aware that such changes will not be welcomed by everyone. Change can indeed stir strong emotion and even resistance.

The author of Ecclesiastes was all too aware of this, people have found change difficult in every generation. My prayer is that as a church family and a wider community, we can discuss such changes with courtesy and humility, recognising each other's point of view but acknowledging that we, as a church, are first and foremost here to worship God, love our communities and grow in faith. Our buildings, as with everything else, should be

servants of that mission rather than merely testaments to past seasons.

Whatever the new season holds for us as individuals or for the life of our churches, what we can be sure of is the future will be different. Only the other day whilst visiting a recently bereaved widow, she told me through her grief that she was starting a new chapter in her life. Whether you are facing a personal or other change or starting a new chapter, may God be with you and bless you.

Bishop's Letter

This month I am leaving Bath and Wells for a while to serve as interim Acting Diocesan Bishop in Coventry diocese. Many of you will be aware that the city of Coventry saw some very heavy shelling during WW2 which resulted in the destruction of the Cathedral in November 1940.

Since then, the new Cathedral has been built and stands alongside the old ruin as a testament of hope and possibility. A very different style of cathedral from the former, a harmony of old and new. It shows us that where conflict can destroy, peace can be found as we seek to live together as the people of God.

I think that this marrying of old and new, modern and traditional styles of architecture, helps us to consider how we fashion the life we are called to live as Christians within our school and parish communities. It is not that we put aside our differences nor require each other to conform to our own shape or form. Rather we recognise the value of listening fully to the other and learning to hear the voice of God. Determining to value the worth of each contribution and then discerning together a faithful walk with God.

This season of Remembrance encourages us to look back and to value the contributions of those who have gone before us, giving their lives in the service of others. It is not about glorifying the concept of war and conflict but the desire to establish a peaceful world for all. As we look back, so we are invited to look forward and commit to establishing a world where all have a place and where the Prince of Peace, Jesus, is our example.

Coventry is the home to the Community of the Cross of Nails. A community of reconciliation based around the cross fashioned by iron nails found within the ruins of the Cathedral following the

fire. It's mission is to live out the practice of peace-building, encouraging people across the world to learn to be reconciled with themselves and one another, as they find reconciliation with God, through Christ.

As I leave here, I do so with plenty of memories, many happy, occasionally sad. Often the latter are those where I have got things wrong and failed to live up to my calling to be the grace-filled child of God I long to be. So, if I have let you down, I am sorry and please pray for me, as I will for you, that God continues to reconcile us to Himself and to one another.

And as we hold our acts of remembrance this month, may we become **re-membered** (put back together), as the people of God.

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
Soulful Nature

My Faith Journey

I was born into a non-Christian family so my faith journey began at the age of 10 when I joined the Boys Brigade. Later we moved to Southend and I joined the Boys Brigade at Shoeburyness Baptist Church. It was a lovely church, very lively and a real church family. I learnt more and more about the Christian faith there and around the age of 16 I started to take God seriously. I committed myself to Him and I was baptised a couple of years after that. It was a wonderful evening – with seven of us baptised during the same service. When I was a student, I was also heavily involved with the Baptist society in the University. They were a great group of Christians and it was a tremendous environment to explore the faith.

Later there was then a period when I drifted away from the church. My faith had taken a back seat - we moved a couple of times in quick succession and just lost touch with the church. But, although I drifted away from God, I don't think I ever completely lost my faith.

Then around 1990 we were living near Merriman Park. We used to pass by and saw the Mission Church gradually being built and quite soon after the new building opened, we decided to try it out. I immediately loved the Mission Church – it just seemed perfect for us. My faith was re-kindled quickly and I committed my life to Jesus again. And if there is a silver lining in my time away from the faith, it is that I found God twice – the first time as a teenager and the second time as an adult.

My main contribution to the church now is through music and in recent years that has been part of my faith journey. In the mid-2000s I started to feel very strongly God calling me to use the musical abilities I had for Him (up until then my involvement in the music had been quite limited). I was doubtful at first because it meant stepping outside my comfort zone. But as I responded

to that call, I kept feeling it more and more strongly and it has been a real blessing to me to be able to play with some great musicians across the Benefice and to be able to contribute to the worship in the church. Ian Jones

Tearfund - supported by Street

At a recent PCC meeting we agreed to s support a project in Nigeria as part of a Tearfund partnership agreement. This project is summarised below

Waste can be a huge challenge. It can threaten every aspect of life, from health to home, to work By March 2024 Tearfund's local partner, Transfer of Appropriate Sustainable Technology and Expertise (TASTE), aims to improve living standards and the local environment for six communities in Plateau State, Nigeria. So they can live free of the illnesses and impacts of waste that can hold people back

The project will help local communities to improve access to water and sanitation for example by building toilets and training in good hygiene practises. More details of the project are available from PCC members.

Mfuwe Anglican parish, Zambia – supported across the benefice.

Father Samson Mwanza, the parish priest, has been in touch with pictures of the work being undertaken to repair and improve one of the churches in the parish, St Agnes, where cracks had appeared in the walls

Be a Foxhole Friend

'TWO CAN ACCOMPLISH MORE ... ' Ecclesiastes 4:9 TLB

Before you get into a foxhole with someone, understand:

- 1. Foxhole friends are few. During the Civil War Abraham Lincoln once received a request to pardon a soldier sentenced to be executed for desertion. The man didn't have a single letter of support vouching for him. Next morning the officer was shocked to hear Lincoln say that the testimony of a friend had sealed his decision to pardon the man. When the officer reminded the President that the request had come with no letter of reference, Lincoln simply stated 'I will be his friend' then signed his pardon. If you have such people in your life value them, they are rare indeed.
- 2. Foxhole friends provide strength before and during the battle. Even before the battle, simply knowing that someone believes in you and will fight for you is uplifting. Epicurus said 'It is not so much our friends' help that helps us, as the confident knowledge that they will help us.'
- 3. Foxhole friends see things from the same perspective. Five-year-old Tracey asked her dad if she could play at the house of a friend. He told her she could as long as she was home by 6 o'clock for dinner. When 6 o'clock rolled around Tracey was nowhere to be seen. After about 25 minutes, Tracey opened the front door. Her father, working to control his impatience, asked where she'd been. 'My friend's doll broke right when I was supposed to leave for home.' Her dad said, 'And I suppose you were helping her fix it?' Tracey replied, 'No, I was helping her cry.' What was Tracey? She was a foxhole friend! Are you?
