Bishop's letter

'God is good ... all the time!'

When I was a priest in Nottingham, I remember thinking that as a parish we seemed to reflect more of the story of the crucifixion of Christ rather than His resurrection. Ours was a parish which had many personal stories of loss and suffering, of challenge and trial, and sometimes this made it difficult to lift our faces to the horizon to see the triumph and glory beyond the grave.

As we approach Easter, I want to encourage us to take time to 'walk the way of the cross', to notice God's grace as we do so, even in the painful moments as well as keeping our eyes fixed on the coming glory.

As I write this, I am catching glimpses of the kingfisher on its perch outside my study window. Always a delight! It sits on the branch across the moat in stillness, watching for the sign of a fish before it suddenly dives and then crests the water with its prize. A splash of colour rarely seen by many. It fills me with hope and joy, two gifts which I think Easter inspires.

Walking through Lent we are continually called to become conscious of our mortality and are reminded of the price Jesus paid on our behalf. Giving himself in death that we might have life. And we have that life because his death was not the end but the beginning of a new chapter, of life in all its fulness.

So, whatever the circumstances of your life this Easter, allow yourself to fully recognise and experience the challenges but never lose the prospect of the glory to come! 'God is good... all the time!'

TEARFUND Cuts to the UK Aid budget, how should we respond?

Tearfund, the Christian overseas mission agency, which Street have been supporting as a mission partner for a number of years, has encouraged us to act in response to the recently announced cuts in UK Overseas Aid. Their article is posted below.

Cutting aid costs lives

The UK Government's decision to cut aid spending down to 0.3% of Gross National Income (GNI) - a cut of around £5.5 billion - is a devastating blow to the communities Tearfund serves.

This will directly affect people living in poverty around the world. Families will go hungry. Children won't be able to go to school. Conflict will continue to ruin lives.

You can speak up and tell the UK Government this is unacceptable.

Will you let your MP know that you care about your global neighbours?

You can act now. Email or write to your MP to speak up for people living in poverty.

The impact for people in poverty

- There will soon be far fewer resources for our humanitarian responses to disasters and emergencies around the world.
- Years of progress and peacebuilding in areas of historic conflict are under threat of being reversed.
- Communities who are still rebuilding after natural disasters will be more vulnerable to the effects of the climate crisis in the future.

As Christians, we're called to come alongside people who are suffering and stand with them against injustice.

A balanced approach to peace

UK aid strengthens global health and security, making the world a safer place. Cutting overseas aid for communities experiencing instability will only exacerbate global insecurity.

'I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people.' 1 Timothy 2:1

How you can pray

- Pray for all the people living in poverty who will be impacted by these aid cuts. Pray that communities will find miraculous resources to continue addressing poverty, building climate resilience, and preparing for disasters, amongst many other things.
- Pray for the UK Government and leaders around the world as they make incredibly difficult decisions in an ever-shifting context. We ask that they will be inspired by the example of Jesus to lead with integrity and justice.
- Pray for the global church, that we will step up to meet the needs of our global neighbours. In a time of great uncertainty, may we respond with generosity and the steadfast compassion of God.

Eco Church – the way forward

As already reported all four churches in our Benefice achieved a Silver Eco Church Award at the end of last year. The following is based on the report about the way forward accepted at PCC meetings in March 2025.

The Eco Church group met in January and agreed that we are prepared to work towards achieving a Gold Award. We recognise that this will require further effort and that it is likely to take some time. Our plan would be to concentrate on a limited number of areas at a time. Some would continue to be addressed at a Benefice level; each parish would work on other areas such as Buildings and Energy, and, Land and Nature, individually depending on the local situation. The new Eco Church survey differs in various ways from the previous one, particularly in the way in which each section begins with a commitment, these are: -

Worship and Teaching

Our church recognises and teaches that creation care and action to address the climate and nature crises are integral to Christian faith, life and worship and has made a visible commitment to A Rocha UK's Eco Church award scheme.

Buildings and energy

Our church has recognised the climate and nature crises and fundamental justice these represent. We have committed to reducing our carbon footprint year on year in line with the Church of England's commitment to net zero.

Land and Nature

Our church recognises the significant contribution churches can make to the U.K.'s target of 30% of land protected for nature by 2030. We have established a plan to manage our land for nature to help us to do this in the most impactful way.

Community and Global Engagement

Our church recognises the impact of the Climate And nature crises and has a plan to take action locally.

Lifestyle

Our church has a strategy or plan to promote ethical and environmentally aware consumption by Individuals and households.

Following on from acceptance of this report the Eco Church group will be meeting soon to develop Action Plans to assist individual parishes and the Benefice with fulfilling these commitments. Heating the parish Church – some good news

A team including members of our Eco Church group, churchwarden and caretaker had been reviewing how we heat the parish church in Street. With the expert (and free) help of the Diocesan buildings team we have looked at how and when we heat the church, including a period when we switched the heating off completely to assess the impact on the temperature. We appreciate that, for worshippers, this left the building colder than you were used to. Thank you for your forbearance, and so we hope the outcome we are able to report below made this worthwhile!

As a result of this exercise, we have managed to reduce our total heating bill for the Parish Church by nearly £1,000 in the last quarter. Whilst this was in the winter and so savings will not be as large for the rest of the year this does represent a considerable cost reduction as well as substantially reducing our carbon footprint.

Work is ongoing to check what temperature we should heat the building to and how much in advance the heating needs to be switched on to make the building warm for services etc and we will keep you posted on developments. Kevin Lawrence (for Street PCC)

Hallowing Service







Everyone is welcome to Compton Dundon church on Thursday 3rd of April at 9:30, for a special service to welcome back the bells at the church. Hallowing (making holy / blessed) of the bells is an ancient service signifying their spiritual purpose of calling the faithful people to worship. The use of Bells dates back to antiquity and are first mentioned in Scripture as the small golden bells attached to the hem of the high priest's ephod (Exodus 28:33, 34, 35). The "bells of the horses" are mentioned by Zechariah (14:20) which were attached to the bridles or belts round the necks of horses trained for war, so as to accustom them to noise and tumult. Early Bells early summoned soldiers to arms as well as Christians to church.

We will be giving thanks to God. In word and song, all will be welcome to attend. Light refreshments will follow the service. Rachel

UPDATE ON THE BELL APPEAL AT COMPTON DUNDON

April 2025 is a milestone in the life of St Andrew's Church and the *villages of Compton Dundon and Littleton.*

After several years of planning, fundraising and then building and restoration works, the bells will finally come back to the church this month. Fully restored and with a new steel frame waiting them, they will "rest" in the church from the 2^{nd of} April for a few days until they are returned to the tower. There will be a special Hallowing Service on Thursday 3rd April at 9.30am (see Sister Rachel's article on the next page) when the bells will be blessed. This is a wonderful opportunity for everyone to come and see the bells because, once back in the tower, it will be many, probably a hundred years or more, before they will see daylight again. And refreshments will be available.

Bishop Ruth to become interim Bishop of Liverpool

Downing Street has recently announced that Bishop Ruth is to become the new suffragan Bishop of Wigan in the Diocese of Liverpool and to serve as the Interim Bishop of Liverpool. Unlike her secondment to Coventry, this will require her to lay down her role as Bishop of Taunton.

Bishop Ruth says, "I have been a bishop for almost 10 years now, serving principally in Bath and Wells, and responding in times of change here and, more recently, in Coventry. Now Archbishop Stephen has asked me to support Liverpool Diocese in their moment of need.

"I shall miss Somerset and the wonderful people and places here and, as I follow God's call for me, I will be praying for all of you, and for all that is to come."

Bishop Ruth's last service in the diocese will be the Chrism service at Wells Cathedral, on Tuesday, 15 April. More details about this service will be announced shortly.

Bishop Michael says, "It is only right that Bishop Ruth answers this call to the Diocese of Liverpool. I am sure you will agree that with her many gifts, Ruth will be a huge blessing to them at this time of healing and hope, before they take steps to determine what they need from the next Bishop of Liverpool.

"Unlike Bishop Ruth's recent move to Coventry, this departure to Liverpool will require her to lay down her role as Bishop of Taunton. I appreciate this could be unsettling news, especially as we have all just welcomed her back to Bath and Wells, but I want to assure you that we will be moving forward to appoint a new Bishop of Taunton with all possible speed. I am sure you will all join me in praying for Bishop Ruth as she prepares to take this next step in her ministry."

Bishop Ruth takes on the role of interim Bishop of Liverpool following the decision of Bishop John Perumbalath to step back from ministry earlier in January 2025. Bishop Ruth will be moving to Liverpool as soon as feasible and a welcome and installation service is planned in Liverpool later in March.

He did it with you in mind

'THEY MADE A CROWN OUT OF THORN BRANCHES AND PLACED IT ON HIS HEAD.' Matthew 27:29 CEV

The hymnist Isaac Watts wrote, 'See from His head, His hands, His feet, sorrow and love flow mingled down. Did e'er such love and sorrow meet, or thorns compose so rich a crown?'

Jesus wore a crown of thorns so you could wear a crown of glory. Thorns in Scripture represent sin. In Eden when Adam and Eve disobeyed, God said, 'The ground will be under a curse ... [it] will produce thorns' (Genesis 3:17-18 CEV). Later He told Israel that unless they purged the land of their enemies, 'they will be like ... thorns in your sides' (Numbers 33:55 NCV). Solomon cautioned: 'Corrupt people walk a thorny, treacherous road' (Proverbs 22:5 NLT). And Jesus warned: 'You can detect them by the way they act, just as you can identify a tree by its fruit. You need never confuse grapevines with thorn bushes' (Matthew 7:16 TLB).

A well-known author writes: 'The crown of thorns Jesus wore represented all our sins. As we were caught in the brambles of envy, anger, shame, discouragement, guilt, bitterness, and unforgiveness, so Jesus, who knew no sin, became "an atoning sacrifice for our sins"' (1 John 4:10 NIV). Not once did Christ use His supernatural powers for personal comfort. With just a word He could have transformed the hard earth into a soft bed … hurled the spit of His accusers back into their faces … and paralysed the hand of the soldier who braided the thorns. But He didn't. Instead, "He cancelled the record of the charges against us and took it away by nailing it to Christ's cross"' (Colossians 2:14 NLT). And He did it with you in mind. Amazing!

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
