A NEW HOME IN MFUWE IS COMPLETED

As a benefice, we have been supporting our partner parish in Mfuwe Zambia, with funds being sent to complete a house for the priest, Father Philip Mwanza and his family. In Zambia, unlike in the UK, the Diocese do not provide housing for incumbents; this is instead the responsibility of each parish.

We have recently heard that the house is now all but finished (see picture) and we have sent prayers that this will be a place of joy and rest for Father Philip and his family.

As part of our support, we continue to pray regularly for the work of Mfuwe parish and have also begun to discuss future projects that might be a priority for Mfuwe, for which our financial support can be used.

Meanwhile, enjoy the picture on the back cover of Father Philip and his wife fording a river as part of their journey to one of the outlying churches in the parish of Mfuwe. Maybe getting to each other churches for benefice services isn't such a major challenge for us after all?

Listening to young people



Later this month I shall be joining young people from around our diocese on a visit to the Taizé community in France. Taizé offers the opportunity to take a step back from daily life, meet people from around the world, join in a week of prayer, worship and Bible teaching, and reflect on our life of faith. In churches we often speak *about* God. To visit Taizé is to have a big encounter *with* God.

This will be the third time I have helped lead a Bath and Wells group on this pilgrimage. Some of our young people will be making a return visit, others attending for the first time. I am looking forward to seeing all they gain from the experience and to simply spending time listening to them and all they have to say. The opportunity to spend an extended time listening to young people is an utter privilege. While more young people are showing an interest in faith, the Church of England is undeniably still dominated by the older generations. Whenever I can, I value immensely the chance to listen to young people – of their hopes and dreams, their fears and perspectives, their insights and understanding. Such listening is essential if young people are to be fully part of the life of our Church. It's vital if we are to continue to see the shoots of growth that are happening across our diocese and the wider church.

We're pursuing this challenge of listening to young people in lots of different ways. It doesn't just happen at Taizé! Our Young Leaders Hub is one arena. Elsewhere we are looking at how young people can play their full part within the life of our diocesan decision-making bodies and in the national church too. I urge you to do the same where you are.

'Nothing about us without us' is a challenge that's sometimes extended when discussing how young people can participate fully wherever they find themselves. What an aim and a prize this would be for us all to pursue.

The Challenge of Good Stewardship

As I was sorting through books choosing which to recycle, one caught my eye. In 'The Earth Will Teach You' Kevin Durrant writes about the natural world and our treatment of creation in an informative and illuminating way taking biblical passages as his starting point. He cites Job's response to the over-simplistic views of his friends:'...ask the animals, and they will teach you, or the birds of the air, and they will tell you; or speak to the Earth, and it will teach you, or let the fish of the sea inform you.' Job 12:7-8

The idea that the natural world has important lessons for us is a common theme in the Bible which is often overlooked. We have an 'increasing disconnection from the rhythms that God has built into the very fabric of the universe.' This includes 24 hour lifestyles and international trade leading to our consumption of non-seasonal produce. Durrant points out that 'the human race is using up natural resources faster than the Earth can replace them.' A tree takes a long time to grow but can be cut down in a few minutes for paper, or to clear the way for a road or housing. Durrant lists just a few of the instances of people in the Bible who encountered God in or through nature including:

Abraham hearing God speak through a tree
Elijah being miraculously fed by Ravens
Ezekiel's vision of God within an approaching desert storm
Jesus meeting with God on his early morning hill walks
Mary Magdalene meeting the risen Christ in a garden
These points and much more in the book are worthy of serious consideration.

Don't Give Place to Pride

'OUR POWER AND ABILITY AND SUFFICIENCY ARE FROM GOD.' 2 Corinthians 3:5 AMPC

Before his 1971 fight with Joe Frazier, Muhammad Ali said: 'There's not a man alive who can whup me. [He jabbed at the air with his blinding left.] I'm too smart. [He tapped his head with his glove.] I'm too pretty. [He showed the cameras his profile, like a bust on a pedestal.] I am the greatest! I am the king! I should be a postage stamp – that's the only way I'll ever get licked!' Guess what happened in that fight? To the amazement of all, especially himself, Ali lost to Frazier. When confidence in your own ability and resources becomes pride, and then becomes arrogance, you're heading for trouble. The Bible says, 'Pride goes before destruction, and a haughty spirit before a fall' (Proverbs 16:18 NKJV).

So, how do you find balance? By remembering that every gift, ability, talent, and resource that you have comes from God. Confidence is essential to success. There is nothing wrong with recognising the gifts God has given you. But the difference between self-confidence and Christ confidence is found in who gets the credit. A good way to keep this thought in the forefront of your life is to practise the art of thanksgiving each day. It's hard to be too self-confident when you acknowledge that you are nothing without God's grace, which is His unmerited, unearned, undeserved favour. The Bible says: 'All of you be submissive to one another, and be clothed with humility, for "God resists the proud, but gives grace to the humble." Therefore humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you in due time' (1 Peter 5:5-6 NKJV).

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
