Good Stewardship in our Churches

Over the last few years our parishes have been encouraged to complete the Church of England's Energy Footprint Tool annually to account for the energy use in each of our churches. We can use the information to compare our annual energy use. Whatever one's views of the climate debate and Net Zero there is no doubt that lower energy use means lower bills. As Christians we should be acting as good stewards, not wasting resources.

So how have we been doing? It is misleading to compare our individual churches with each other as they are very different in size and usage so my comparisons are for each individual building keeping in mind that some variation may be due to the weather conditions which vary slightly year by year.

2024 reports

Compton Dundon's energy use reduced by around a tenth compared with 2022. The impact of their carbon emissions was reduced by 85% by switching to a 'green' tariff.

Installation of solar panels at **Street Mission Church** in 2022 has partly contributed to a reduction in energy use there by about a fifth. However, the main source of CO2 emissions is the use of gas so more of the savings come from careful management of heating controls (thermostats). When the boilers need replacing switching to electricity as a source of heating could mean a more

efficient use of the energy generated by the solar panels as well as greener energy use overall.

You may recall that decisions were made towards the end of 2024 to reduce the heating in **Street Parish Church**, this had an immediate impact to the overall energy use in 2024 and should reduce our energy use (and bills) further this year.

Walton have reduced energy use by about a fifth compared to 2022. Their planned refurbishment should help to improve energy efficiency further.

Net Zero

Whatever one's views, the Church of England has committed itself to a Net Zero Carbon Programme which 'aims to equip, resource and support all parts of the Church to reduce carbon emissions from the energy used in its buildings, schools and through work-related transport by 2030'. A national Report provides a snapshot of the work and impact of the Programme. The report, which shows how many churches across the country are saving money on their energy bills after making changes to their buildings, their heating systems and the management of them, is available to read at: -

The story of Nehemiah and healthy churches, our Autumn sermon series

The Archdeaconry of Wells Visitation Service at St Cuthbert's in Wells in June 2025.

Every year, the 'Archdeacons' Visitations take place. These are formal church services, during which Churchwardens across each Archdeaconry are admitted. As well as the opportunity Visitations give for Archdeacons to thank churchwardens publicly and personally, and to pray with and for them, it is also when elected churchwardens are formally admitted to the office of churchwarden. This is a legal requirement, and until this happens those elected are not formally churchwardens'.

The policy sets out when and how often the bells will be rung and the various responsibilities of the bellringers and the PCC. Visiting teams wanting to ring the bells are asked to book via the church office and any compliments, comments or complaints about bell ringing should similarly be addressed to the office so we can get an idea of what's working well and what is perhaps working less well.

The sound of bells ringing out across our communities is a powerful reminder that the church is still here, still welcoming and still active but bells can also be quite noisy!

The Bishop's Letter

Do you use Wikipedia? It's often a very convenient place to look for information when we want to know more about something or about a person. But, perhaps, like me you've discovered its limitations. As you might anticipate from a free online encyclopaedia to which anyone can contribute and is open to anyone to edit it is both impressively collaborative and also sometimes incomplete or less than fully accurate. Nevertheless, it remains for me – and perhaps you? – a go-to source of quick information.

So, I wasn't surprised when I consulted Wikipedia's 'August anniversaries' to find it is less than comprehensive about the Christian calendar this month. St Bartholomew's Day is recorded on 24 August – alongside Ukraine Independence Day which surely also deserves marking. Bartholemew (usually identified as Nathanael, one of the twelve disciples of Jesus) isn't generally well celebrated on his festival day, except in places where he's the patron saint of the parish and church, such as Crewkerne where the annual charter fair remembers their link with St Bart. Even so their fair has been moved into September after the end of the holiday season.

August frequently means reduced activity, and fewer events. If that's an opportunity for catching our breath and taking a break from the challenges of deadlines and expectations, then all well and good. But let's not forget, despite them being omitted from the Wikipedia list, the other red-letter August days in the

calendar. On 15 August we honour the Blessed Virgin Mary, mother of our Lord Jesus, and on the 6 August, we mark the glorious Transfiguration of our Lord. That festival day recalls how Peter, James and John experienced on a mountain top the transformation of Jesus' physical appearance, enabling them to glimpse the glory of his divinity.

Make the most of these three significant festival days in August. As well, don't forget the other significant days this month, such as Ukraine Independence Day (24), VJ day (15) marking the end of World War 2, and – another date missed in the Wikipedia list – the 80th anniversary of the dropping of the first atomic bomb on Hiroshima. The gift and responsibility that Christian teachers have, stayed with me as I have gone on to lead groups over many years. She reminded me recently of how she prayed for 'her girls' and continued as we grew into adulthood.

She realised I had wandered from the Lord when I left home to go to Teachers' Training College in Yorkshire – her prayers continued!

PARKING AT THE MISSION CHURCH

We are fortunate to have a car park at the Mission Church, well used both by church members for Sunday and midweek services, meetings, church 'business' and events, and by our many community users.

However, the car park is small and can often get full. Occasionally, sadly, other vehicles whose drivers are neither attending events or services, also park there despite the notices requesting them not to.

As things get busier on Sundays and midweek we are looking at ways in which we can ensure the parking is kept available for those for whom it is intended. We want to trial a new system from September.

If you are coming to services, regular events or meetings at the Mission Church or the Rectory there will be no change and there is nothing you need to do. However, if you park at other times, we are asking you to request a 'ticket' to display in your windscreen. In an effort to dissuade those who are parking without permission, we will be requesting cars who should not be there to move, and the 'ticket' is to make sure we don't mistakenly ask people who are there legitimately. We won't recognise everyone's car!

To get your free 'ticket,' please email or ring the church office with your name, telephone number, the church which you regularly attend and your car registration number before September. Your ticket will then be delivered to you via your church.

Finally, a reassurance that church family members are welcome to use the car park at any time. We would ask:

- you are not parking for events, meetings or services, please check with the administrator or caretaker beforehand, in case there is a funeral or other big event where the space will be needed.
- Please display your 'ticket.'
- If you are using the Mission Church car park for personal reasons, perhaps instead of a commercial car park, please consider making a donation to help cover maintenance costs, using the wall safe or card machine in the Mission Church foyer.



Do your family know your wishes?

One of the sadnesses of my ministry is when I hear of longstanding church members who have died with their funeral arrangements containing little or no acknowledgement of the Christian faith which was such an important part of their life.

Whilst there can be good reasons why this happens, it did cause me to reflect on how we communicate our funeral wishes to friends and family. This is never an easy conversation, and it can be tempting to either put it off, assume that those who will be organising our funeral will know our wishes, or imagine that the involvement of the church or a Christian minister will just be assumed.

These days, with so many other options available, we are sometimes finding that families, in the midst of their personal grief, may not always think to involve the church in what is planned, even if they knew that their loved one was a Christian. Can I therefore encourage you, if having a Christian funeral is important to you, to talk to your family about your wishes or better still write them down and perhaps organise a funeral plan?

If you want help with having what may be difficult conversations, please do have a word with a member of the clergy team.

Read Your Bible

'IF YE CONTINUE IN MY WORD, THEN ARE YE MY DISCIPLES INDEED.' John 8:31 KJV

Imagine what would happen if you committed yourself with equal vigour to reading your Bible before you leave for work, school, or wherever? It would change your life, and impact those around you!
